

### **Proper Nouns and Adjectives**

Capitalize proper nouns and proper adjectives. A common noun is the name of a whole group of persons, places, or things. A proper noun is the name of an individual person, place, or thing. A proper adjective is an adjective formed from a proper noun.

Common Noun	Proper Noun	Proper Adjective
person	Elizabeth	Elizabethan
country	Spain	Spanish
city	Paris	Parisian

Proper nouns occur in great variety. The following rules with their illustrations will help you solve1the capitalization problems that proper nouns present.

### Names of Persons

Capitalize the names of persons and also the initials or abbreviations that stand for those names:

J. R. R. Tolkien

John Ronald Revel Tolkien

Ella T. Grasso

Ella Tambussi Grasso

Capitalize titles used with names of persons and also the initials or abbreviations that stand for those titles. The <u>titles</u> Mr., Mrs., Ms., and Miss are always capitalized:

Rev. M. R. Eaton

Judge Esther Falks

Lt. Patricia Smith

Dr. John J. DeBender

Mr. Edward Scott

Professor White

Do not capitalize titles used as common nouns:

- Have you seen your doctor?
- She is the company president.
- The judge entered the courtroom.

Capitalize titles of people whose rank is very important, even when these titles are used without proper names:

the **P**ope

a United States Senator

the President of the United States

the Prime Minister of England

### Family Relationships

Capitalize such words as mother, father, aunt, and uncle when these words are used



### as names:

- Hello, Mother. Is Dad home yet?
- Where is Uncle Joe right now?

When the noun is modified by a possessive word, a, or the, it is not capitalized:

- My aunt is going to visit us next week.
- Do you know when John's uncle will arrive?

### The Pronoun *I*

Capitalize the pronoun *I*.

- Is he taller than I? I am sure that he is.

### The Supreme Being and Sacred Writings

Capitalize all words referring to God, to the Holy Family, and to religious scriptures:

the Gospel

Buddha

the Torah

God

the Lord

the Bible

Allah

the Virgin Mary

the Book of Exodus

### Preposition or Adverb?

Many words used as prepositions may also be used as adverbs. There is an easy way to tell the difference. A preposition never appears alone. It is always followed by its object-a noun or pronoun. If the word appears in a phrase, it is probably a preposition. If it is not in a phrase, it is probably an adverb. Examples:

- I drew a line across the paper. (preposition)
- He dared me to jump across. (adverb)
- Ted put his books *down*. (adverb)
- He ran down the street. (preposition)

An interjection is a word or group of words used to express strong feelings. Sometimes an interjection is a sound rather than an actual word. It may convey anger, surprise, disgust, joy, or sorrow.

In any case, an interjection shows strong feeling. As a result, it is often followed by an exclamation mark (!).

These are examples of interjections:

- Phew! We made it.
- Never! I won't ever do that. Terrific!
- Yikes! I'm late again.
- Great! You made the squad
